It was a project that required some serious planning, persistence, collaboration, and hard work! All December, we have lots of "stars" to celebrate - theatre performances, band and chorus concerts - all examples of hard work, persistence, and collaboration.

The photo also literally references stairs - those areas of growth on which we are focused. Each year, we engage in ongoing assessment of how we are doing as a school. We look at academic data, feedback from student, faculty, and parent surveys, and data such

as student discipline and attendance. We examine this as a faculty, with support from EL Education, through a structured mid-year and end-of-year review process. We also look at this data in our School Improvement Team, bringing in the perspective of parents. We pull all of this together in an annual work plan, outlining specific long-term goals and annual objectives. We focus our work plan goals on each of the aspects of student achievement outlined by EL Education - academic knowledge and skills, character, and high quality work, as well as school leadership.

Our specific objectives for this year are as follows:

Academic growth:

Students will demonstrate and apply the foundational knowledge and skills necessary for success at every level of their education.

This objective is measured through student performance on standardized end of year tests. Overall, our student scores are higher than surrounding district schools. However, like most other schools nationwide, there is a gap between achievement in reading and math. Our long-term goal is to decrease this gap by raising math scores.

Our specific benchmarks for this year are:

- Grade level proficiency in reading 80% (increase from 76%)
- Grade level proficiency in math: 65% (increase from 60%)
- College & Career Readiness: This refers to the State's definition of test scores of "4" and "5" as demonstrating college-readiness. While we do not agree that these test scores indicate college readiness or lack of readiness this is a standard that the state uses to assess our school's performance. Our benchmark for this year is to increase the percent of students who score a 4 or 5 on the end of year exams from 62% to 65%.

Because we believe student academic achievement goes beyond standardized tests, our goal includes a measure of deeper learning. Students will demonstrate the deeper learning outcomes of "critical thinking and problem solving" via Expedition products, in which they consider a variety of approaches and produce innovative solutions.

Last year, we focused on ensuring that we had strong curriculum across all grades, aligned with state standards. This year, we are focusing on how we are assessing students, and how teachers use assessment data to improve instruction.

Character

Students will demonstrate their growth as ethical students, with the ability to self-regulate and contribute positively to our school community.

We focus on this objective in nearly everything we do. Specifically, we are working to continually strengthen our Crew program, helping every Crew leader develop skills and curriculum to use in Crew. We have also dedicated time to reviewing our discipline procedures to ensure consistent and fair application of behavior expectations.. Finally, we have been learning more about Restorative Practices, and how we can support students to develop the skills they need to contribute positively to our school community.

High Quality Work

Students will transfer understanding and skills to new problems, through high quality summative projects and products.

In both Expedition projects and regular classroom projects, we are focused on providing students with projects that are challenging and engaging.

Leadership

School leaders will model and foster a crew spirit schoolwide, grounded in and supporting a a cohesive school vision that everyone feels involved in.

In 2018-19, this means specific emphasis on:

- -administrative consistency in managing and supporting student behavior
- -supporting teacher-leaders (especially in leading teams and monitoring work plan progress)
- -positive engagement with families, through opportunities to participate, contribute, and celebrate with students
- supporting alignment of curriculum, instruction, and assessment, and supporting teachers in using data to improve student learning

These are big objectives, which require not only the persistence, collaboration, and hard work of our faculty and school administrators, but also the collaboration and hard work of students and families! As families, you play a central role in both your student's achievement and the success of the school. From helping ensure that your student arrives to school on time each day, to supporting their learning through homework completion, to attending school functions to show your student that school is valued in your household - you play a critical role. We are, truly, Crew!!

I look forward to hearing from you in upcoming Parent Coffees. We will be holding these every 4th Thursday, from 8:30 - 9:15 am. These are an informal opportunity to learn more about our educational program, to ask questions, and to be directly engaged with us. Our next coffee will be January 24, and our topic will be an overview of EL Education.

Construction Update

The construction project has been moving right along! As of last week, we were on schedule. Much of the work so far has been grading, water retention, and preparing the construction site and foundation pad. They began pouring the concrete footers last week, so the building footprint is beginning to take shape! They're working hard to get this done before the asphalt plants close for the winter - so keep your fingers crossed! We can't make any promises on this just yet.

Our walls will begin arriving on campus within the next week or two! This will be exciting, as the giant walls roll onto campus and are swung into place. While this will be fun to watch, it also brings safety concerns. We will need to close off our main drive (in front of the office & Einstein buildings) at times when walls are being set. We will also need to move students from the Johnson and Parks buildings at certain points when walls are being set just behind those buildings. We have lots of fun ways for you to get involved this fall. This month, we're shining the spotlight on a whole family of volunteers. If you've been at any FSI event- chances are you've seen this family in action, or they have been hard at work behind the scenes!

For the Breen-McMullans, volunteering and supporting FSI is a family event. For 8th grade Rowan, one of the student bakers who went all out for our Annual Fund, the answer to why volunteer is simple. Why not? There's no reason not to volunteer! Rowan is a consistent volunteer on the gardening and grounds Crew, and is currently building a pollinator box for our campus. Sophomore Quinn volunteers because "It's cool to go into school each day and see the things I've helped with and it feels good to help improve the school." They both especially enjoy the projects where they get to build and tinker with things and figure out how to do something.

For Ann-Marie and Tim, volunteering is just as simple. If there is work to do - they are here to help.

"Our family has tried to fulfill our volunteer hours since the beginning of the school, mostly because there was/is so much to be done. Often that was just showing up for work days, baking for teachers, doing little things that were needed and that usually added up to around our 40 hours we were supposed to do. In Spring of 2016 I was at a school-wide meeting and one parent thought it would be great if there was landscaping around the school sign at Sardis Road. I like to garden and I was at a point that I had a good amount of free time and I thought, I can just do this rather than wait for someone else to organize something. I really enjoyed the work and there is definitely a feeling of satisfaction in seeing that spot look better each year as the plants fill in. After that a board member asked if I'd lead the garden crew. My gut reaction was to say no as leading is not really something I was comfortable with. For months I stewed and ignored responding and then thought about what FSI asks of our two boys. At every SLC they talk what Habits of Scholarship they feel they need to work on further to improve themselves. I realized that if we expect our kids to be leaders and collaborators to be a part of the future that they create then I should also push myself out of my comfort zone and do something that felt hard for me. So I said I would lead the garden crew and have organized some work days and I'm sure there will be more to do after construction. Planting around school is great because you instantly see what you and other volunteers have done to make things look better and it is visible everyday. Somehow I have also gotten involved in events and fundraising and helped plan our first auction last year. I will be the first to say I have no experience in any of these areas but I have time and am willing to learn and it has been fun to challenge myself to do something new and continue to grow. I believe in FSI so it is really easy to ask for thing on the school's behalf. I have met some wonderful people in the school community through volunteering and have also realized in our larger community that there are many great people who are willing to help us in ways large and small and that has been really gratifying.

We have been at FSI since it started. We were looking for a school that would be a good fit for our boys who are very hands on, experiential learners and we have not been disappointed. Each year they have had teachers that really connect with them as learners and as people and I feel so grateful that they are at FSI. I think the other great thing about being part of a newer school is that you have the ability to make a big impact. If you see a need you can ask if you can help. Leave your mark. Challenge yourself to try something new. I would urge others to get involved in any way, large or small, that you can."
